

Iowa's "Move Over" law expanded

We are all aware that most drivers don't bother to move over or even slow down as they pass you by on

the side of the road. But as of July 1, Iowa's newly expanded move over or slow down law – Iowa Code section 321.323A – now requires motorists to move over or slow down when approaching ANY stationary vehicle with flashing lights activated, including passenger vehicles with hazar

passenger vehicles with hazard lights. Those who disobey the law could receive a hefty fine or potentially lose their driver's license.

This law is particularly important to Chariton Valley Electric because it helps keep our line workers and maintenance workers safe as they often need to perform difficult and dangerous work with electric equipment on the shoulder of road. Even though our employees set out caution signs, orange cones, wear high visibility gear and turn on their vehicles' emergency lights, other


motorists often fail to give them the room they need to do their job safely. This law will help keep Iowa's

roads safe for everyone – drivers, emergency responders, utility workers and others. But the law doesn't do much good if motorists don't know about it. Please share this safety message with other drivers in your family, especially younger drivers who don't

have as much experience behind the wheel. We can each do our part to keep Iowa's roads safe by simply moving over or slowing down (preferably both) when we see stopped vehicles on the side of the road.



"I'm a product of rural lowa, and I'm driven to create opportunity throughout this state. I believe the heart, soul and spirit of Iowa will always remain in our small towns and rural communities. That's why I'm creating the Governor's Empower Rural Iowa Initiative. I want concrete solutions for the unique challenges of rural lowa in order to maintain its vibrancy and ensure there is opportunity everywhere."

Governor Kim Reynolds made this statement on July 18 when she announced the new initiative, which establishes a partnership with the Iowa Rural Development Council to identify challenges facing rural Iowa and recommend solutions to state policymakers.

The recommendations will be provided by an executive committee and three task forces. The Investing in Rural Iowa Task Force will focus on improving access to quality housing in rural lowa; the Growing Rural lowa Task Force will identify ways to encourage leadership development and strategic development in rural communities; and the Connecting Rural Iowa Task Force will look into effectively and sustainably financing broadband connectivity.
