Right tools for the right job

Chariton Valley Electric Management and Team,

It's been said that to do a job right, you need the right tools. Yesterday, our old utility pole was replaced. According to Thad DeMoss, it was probably put into service back in the 1940s. That would make the original pole between 70 and 80 years old, and during that time other utilities have used the same pole, making the replacement time other utility cables process even more difficult. Now, double the number of utility cables (power, phone, cable TV, etc.) because the same pole serves two homes (power, phone, cable TV, etc.) because the same pole and place the new and it becomes nearly impossible to pull the old pole and place the new one in the same hole or close by. With the number of lightning strikes to the pole over the years and the number of surrounding trees, what would seem to many as a simple small pole replacement becomes a more significant project.

Your Vermeer vacuum excavator was the perfect solution to create and clean the hole necessary to set the new pole and avoid the many wires located below grade. Add to that the use of the boom truck to wire located below grade and set the new one and the bucket truck to allow remove the old pole and set the new one and the bucket truck to allow the linemen access to the business end of the pole, and you have the complete package of tools for the job. President Rand Fisher. "The co-op provides important technical and financial assistance that many times is a key component in successfully securing projects that create jobs and support community vitality."


