Resolve to be energy-efficient this year!

Here are five efficiency ideas, which can save you energy dollars:

- 1. Hire a chimney sweep Each year, before you fire up the furnace or build a fire in the fireplace, play it safe and hire a professional chimney sweep to clean out your flue and check out the equipment. A clean furnace, fireplace and flue will not only be safer but will burn more efficiently, thus saving fuel and energy dollars.
- 2. Replace that old refrigerator in the basement – If you have an old "second" refrigerator in the garage or basement, you're spending more than you should on energy usage. Look for an **ENERGY STAR-qualified model** and see how much money it saves on your utility bill.
- 3. Schedule a home energy audit - An audit, by a qualified professional, will find all kinds of improvements to make to your home's energy "envelope." You'll have a list of changes to make over time to save energy dollars. Check with Chariton Valley Electric Cooperative to see what we offer.
- 4. Install ceiling fans or buy portables - Simply using a fan to move warm air in the winter and cool air in the summer will make you feel about 4 degrees F warmer or cooler, respectively. That may prevent you from fiddling with the thermostat and spending more energy dollars.
- 5. Caulk your windows Sealing windows, particularly ones you don't open, with clear silicone caulk on the inside of the window can reduce air leaks and keep out those pesky Asian beetles that swarm in the fall and squeeze into your house through miniscule leak holes around windows and doors.
