electricity to communities that were in the dark, we have been a cornerstone of the community and economic development in rural Iowa for decades.

Living on co-op lines is more than knowing there are people working to bring you safe, reliable and affordable electric service. Living on co-op lines is an investment in our community. We are owned by you, our members. We have a vested interest in assuring our community is prosperous. We accomplish this by investing in economic development and community service projects and programs.

Since 2017, CVEC has facilitated \$12 million in loans through the USDA's Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant Program, with \$10 million coming in 2018 alone. What is even more impressive, this \$10 million award to CVEC projects came for approximately \$50 million that was awarded across the entire U.S. in the program. Iowa receives more money

through these USDA programs than any other state. The main reason is due to the never-ending support of

the Iowa Area Development

CVEC received \$300,000 from the USDA to begin a revolving loan fund in the late 1980s. Over the last 30 years, we have loaned over \$1 million to projects of all sizes that have benefited our service territory.

We will continue to practice one of our core principles, "Concern for Community" as we work to preserve and sustain rural Iowa. When new industries come to town and current businesses expand, they bring additional members to CVEC. This only serves to build a larger electric load and help keep our rates low. We want businesses and nonprofits in our great seven-county service territory to know that CVEC is interested in working with you and investing in community betterment projects.

I encourage you to view CVEC as not only your electric utility provider but as a local business that brings pride and prosperity to our community. In accordance with the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of Chariton Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc., the Board of Directors must appoint a nominating committee to select the names of director candidates to be placed on the ballot and voted on at the annual meeting August 5, 2019.

The nominating committee will

meet April 18, 2019, at 6 p.m. at the office of Chariton Valley Electric Cooperative. The committee shall make a good faith effort to nominate two candidates for each director position to be filled at the 2019 annual meeting.

Directors whose terms expire include: Marchelle Brown – District 1 Randy Gottschalk – District 2 Kenny VandenBerg – District 5 Additional pominations

Additional nominations (nominations not made by the committee) may be made by written petition with the signatures of at least 15 members. Bylaws of the Cooperative provide that such petitions must be filed by July 8, 2019, not less than 30 days prior to the meeting at which the directors will be elected. Petition forms may be picked up and filed at the cooperative's office.

Every member has the right to vote. To exercise your right to vote in person, please attend the August 5, 2019, annual meeting. If unable to attend, you have the option to vote by mail. Your notice of the annual meeting will be mailed to you the last week of July 2019. A ballot will be enclosed for you to cast your vote and return.

This is your cooperative, so please exercise your rights as a member to volunteer to have your name on the ballot for a director position and/or vote during the director elections.
