BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Chariton Valley Electric Cooperative is owned by the members we serve and democratically governed by the same. As a member yourself, you have a voice in the operation of the cooperative through your member-elected board of directors.

The cooperative's board is comprised of nine individuals with varied skill sets. perspectives, experience, expertise and views to create a well-rounded group that can represent the full spectrum of members and communities we serve. PREVIOUS MEETING MINUTES 2022

CHARITON VALLEY ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS AUGUST 1, 2022

The 75th Annual Meeting of the Members of Chariton Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc. was held at the King Opera House, 115 Benton Avenue East in Albia, Iowa, at 6:30 P.M. on the 1st day of August 2022.

The meeting was called to order by Michael Miller, President of the cooperative, who presided. Secretary Norman Major acted as Secretary of the meeting and kept the minutes thereof.

Chairman Miller asked everyone to stand for the National Anthem and the Pledge of Allegiance. Hannah Anderson, a recent graduate of Albia Community High School, sang the National Anthem. Marc Smiarowski, Chariton Valley Electric's Staking and Field Technician, then gave the invocation. CEO/General Manager Leilani Todd extended a thank you to Marc Smiarowski and proceeded to offer welcoming remarks.

The Secretary stated that the members who had voted by mail had been checked, and that a quorum was present for the transaction of business. A list of the members who voted will be retained by the cooperative and will be used in lieu of roll call.

The Secretary noted the Notice of the Annual Meeting of the Members had been mailed to all members and presented the proof of the due mailing of said Notice. The Notice will stand as mailed. The Secretary noted the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Members held August 2, 2021, were distributed to the members and approval of the same was included on the ballot.

The annual reports of President Miller, CEO/General Manager Leilani Todd, and Treasurer Marchelle Brown were recorded and played on the screen prior to the meeting.

The Board of Directors of Chariton Valley Electric Cooperative is elected by you, the membership, to ensure the cooperative remains financially stable. Annually, the board approves an operational, construction work improvement and capital investment budget. Every month your directors review the current financial statements and compare them with the annual business plan and financial position of the previous year.

Our annual independent financial audit, performed by Forvis LLP of Des Moines, was completed in April 2023 and presented to the Board of Directors on April 27, 2023. The Board of Directors and staff work diligently to ensure costs are kept competitive while

also providing safe and reliable services. The board approved the year-end audit report to officially close the 2022 books.

For 2022, total equity was at a strong 35.14 percent and overall audited net margins totaled \$795,204. Capital credits, also referred to as net margins, include any earnings left after expenses. These margins are then allocated back to members. CVEC is pleased to report that your cooperative is refunding capital credits for the 40th year in a row. This year we are refunding a total of \$250,000, and since 2003, your cooperative has refunded over 4 million dollars. This is the cooperative difference that sets us apart from other utilities.



Note: If you qualify to receive a capital credit check:

- Greater than or equal to \$25 – a check will be mailed to your address on file after August 7, 2023.
- Less than \$25 your active account at CVEC will be credited.

Even though our members continue to become more energy conscious, we maintained strong kilowatthour (kwh) sales of just over 102 million kwh sold. As in the past, the bulk of our sales (59 percent) come from our residential class members, with the remaining Cost of Power 41 percent from 50% our commercial classes.

One of the major components of our budget is the cost of power, which represents 50 percent of the total cost of providing you with electrical service. Our power supplier, Northeast Missouri Electric Power Cooperative (Northeast Power), provides us with the power that we then distribute to our members. The graph below depicts this expense in relation to the cooperative's other expenses.

MEET THE 2023 DIRECTOR CANDIDATES



District 2: Randy Gottschalk, incumbent, and his wife Janet have lived in rural Lovilia for nearly 20 years where they hobby farm as well as operate several real estate investments. They have two children, Brandi of San Carlos, CA (including two grandkids Jones-9 and Harvey-6) and Devon of Brighton, MA.

Randy has served on the Chariton Valley Electric Board of Directors for a total of 9 years, earning his CCD, BLC and Director Gold accreditations, which involve completing over 20 eight-hour classes related to the legal and operating aspects of a cooperative's operation - demonstrating his commitment to being a director. Randy knows a director's responsibility is to act as a fiduciary on the members' behalf and is committed to fulfilling that obligation. Randy's business experience of owning and operating the Kentucky Fried Chicken in Ottumwa for nearly 20 years brings the knowledge of business operations to Chariton Valley Electric.

When asked what important issues the cooperative board needs to focus on in the near future, Randy replied, "to keep liabilities low, keep employee turnover to a minimum, keep costs down and to continue providing electric service with little, to no interruptions."



District 4: Karla Heffron, candidate, resides in Melrose and has been a cooperative member for 27 years. She and her husband Steve have two children, Ryley and Nicholas.

Heffron has financial and business management skills she would bring to the board from being self-employed, managing and operating Becks Hybrid Seed, farming 450

acres of row crop, hay and cattle and previously working at Hy-Vee for 25 years. Heffron has also served on many boards and committees including Monroe County 4H as a leader, JDRF, Chariton Rotary Club and Chariton girls recreational softball league.

When asked what important issues she believes the cooperative board needs to focus on in the near future, Karla replied, "the cooperative needs to focus on keeping up with the changing technology and also recruiting and retaining a skilled work force."



District 5: Richard Welsh, incumbent, resides in the city of Albia, is a lifelong resident of Monroe County and a proud member of the REC for over 50 years. He and his wife Kathy have four children, nine grandchildren, one great grandson and one great granddaughter.

For 20 years, Richard farmed a row crop and livestock operation west of Lovilia. He is now

retired after spending close to 30 years working in the livestock feed services industry.

Richard has served on the CVEC board for 22 years, where he has held numerous executive officer positions throughout the years. He also currently serves on CVEC's transmission cooperative Northeast Power's Board. He has completed the necessary educational courses to earn his CCD, BLC and Director Gold accreditation. He is an active member of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Albia and formerly served on the Monroe County Extension Council for 11 years.

When asked what important issues the cooperative board needs to focus on in the near future, Richard replied, "we have many challenges ahead of us with tougher emissions regulations coming and the cost pressures that go along with it. As a cooperative, we need to work on ways to keep costs down, but also continue providing the excellent service and availability that you have come to expect."
